Active ways to revise Literature

- Making timelines/storyboards of events in the texts
- Creating spider diagrams or mindmaps about characters and themes
- Rereading texts or watching film/theatre productions and making notes/ comparisons
- Memorising key quotes using visual images can help with this. Post-it notes are useful!
- Creating glossaries of key terms
- Making flashcards and quick quizzes to test knowledge
- Creating summary sheets. Start off with 100 words, then go down to 50, 30, 10, 5.

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
